Non-Conformist Religion:

Roman Catholicism

'Traditional' religion

Recusant / Recusancy

From Latin recusare

"To refuse, to object"

Initial tolerance

Elizabeth desires outward conformity

No "windows into men's souls"

External pressures

Papacy

Jesuit Mission

Mary, Queen of Scots

St. Bartholomew's Day Massacre

Protestants kill Catholics in Paris

Fears of Catholic reprisals

From early 1570s, greater focus on recusancy

Catherine Howard

Fifth wife of Henry VIII

Elizabethans from Recusant Families

William Byrd (c. 1540-1623)

Thomas Tallis (c. 1505-1585)

(Later) John Donne (1572-1631)

William Allen's College at Douai

Founded in 1868

Training center for English Catholics

Expect martyrdom

Avoid politics; focus on the theological

Protestant Challenges to the Settlement:

Dissenters

Troublesome

Relatively few, but when visible, very visible

Obviously non-conformist

Eventually classed, prosecuted as recusants

Puritans

A couple of different kinds of challenges Non-conformist Puritans: easier to deal with Anglican Puritans:

Not outside of the Church of England Not agents of foreign powers Not politically opposed to Elizabeth's rule*

Not easily disposed of!

Could hold positions in C of E (some did)

Dissatisfied with Settlement Anglicanism

Protestant Challenges to the Settlement: Anglican Puritans:

Settlement:

too much Rome

not enough Scripture (a la Geneva)

Many had embraced Calvinism in exile

If Knox could make Scotland presbyterian...

Steps toward further English reform

Abolish the episcopacy

Institute presbyterianism

Assemblies

Sessions

Liturgical renovations (a la Geneva)

Eliminate Book of Common Prayer

Gathered from 'the popish dunghill'

Sign of cross, laying on of hands, rings

Calendar, saints, bowing, kneeling

Music, singing

Toss vestments, ornaments, ceremonies

Thomas Cartwright (c. 1535-1603)

Cambridge theologian

'New Testament church'

Regulative principle: worship & order

An Admonition to Parliament (1572)

Walter Travers (c. 1548-1635)

Cambridge educated

To Theodore Beza's Geneva

Ordained in Antwerp by T. Cartwright

Lecturer, Temple Church (1581)

Strategies

BCP worship PLUS other forms

Calvinist accompaniments to episcopacy

Prophesyings & classis

Giving lip service & undermining order

Difficult to discipline



Articulating Anglicanism

Seeking a Positive Definition

Not Rome, Not Anabaptism. What is it?

'Christ's Holy Catholic Church' (BCP)

Not separated from other Christians

Historically

Geographically

Not under papal jurisdiction

Not bound to all prior customs

Elizabeth's Archbishops of Canterbury

Matthew Parker (1559-1575)

Scholarly, conservative (primitive), stable

Willing to disagree with Queen

Edmund Grindal (1576-1583)

Not committed to Elizabethan uniformity

Puritan sympathies

Wouldn't suppress prophesyings

John Whitgift (1583-1604)

Calvinist theology, episcopal order

Enforced BCP: Court of High Commission



Articulating Anglicanism

Seeking a Positive Definition John Jewel (1522-1571)

Oxford educated (Merton College)
Elected to Corpus Christi, Oxford
Studied with Peter Martyr Vermigli
Fled to Continent during Mary's reign
Returned after Elizabeth's accession
Committed to Elizabethan reforms
Bishop of Salisbury, 1559-1560
Moderated his quasi-Puritan zeal
Opposed Romanist disputants

1559 sermon
1560-1562 Apologia ecclesiae Anglicanae
English translation, 1564
Catholic, not Roman
Scripture, Fathers, Councils
In time, distanced from Romans & Puritans



Articulating Anglicanism

Seeking a Positive Definition

Richard Hooker (1554-1600)

Reputable, but not wealthy family

Uncle, John Hooker

Studied on Continent with Vermigli

Connections with Bp. Jewel

Patronage of John Jewel

Provides for Hooker's education (& others)

Fellow, Corpus Christi (1577)

Ordained priest (Bp Sandys, London, 1579)

Tutor: Edwin Sandys, Jr., George Cranmer



Articulating Anglicanism

Seeking a Positive Definition

Richard Hooker (1554-1600)

1580: loses fellowship (gets it back later)

1581: St. Paul's Cross preacher

1584: Rector, St. Mary's Drayton Beauchamp

1585: Master (Rector), Temple Church,

By appointment of the Queen

May have been a compromise candidate?

1591: St. Andrew's Boscomb, Wiltshire

1591: subdean, Salisbury Cathedral

1595: Rector

St. Mary the Virgin, Bishopsbourne

St. John the Baptist, Barham, Kent

Died 3 Nov. 1600

Bishopsbourne Rectory

Buried in chancel

Seeking a Positive Definition Richard Hooker (1554-1600)

Public Conflict at the Temple 1585-1586:

Controversial relationship with Deputy

Puritan Walter Travers

'Inherited'

Succession and appointment

Travers: assist Dr Richard Alvey, Master

Alvey's death requires replacement

Travers nominated by William Cecil

Radically Puritan changes at Temple

Removed prayers & Scripture lessons

Allowed more time for lectures

Revised communion practice

Other nominees

Nicholas Bond (AbC Whitgift)

Richard Hooker (AbY Edwin Sandys)



Articulating Anglicanism

Seeking a Positive Definition

Richard Hooker (1554-1600)

Hooker: gets job, appointed by Queen

Hooker invites Travers to stay on

(Hooker secures stability for Travers!)

Who should give the first sermon?

Hooker, new Master

Travers

Insistent representative of old Master

Should present Hooker to congregation

Ensuing confrontation

Travers: obviously angered by Hooker

Encouraged to meet & address problems

Publicly criticizes Hooker instead

Hooker taught 'contrary to the gospel'

Knelt, prayed before sermon (after)

Didn't keep Travers' peculiar service

Hooker preaches in a.m.

Travers preaches against him in p.m.



Articulating Anglicanism

Seeking a Positive Definition

Richard Hooker (1554-1600)

Theological Disagreements

Hooker opposed Travers' Puritanism

Rejected supralapsarian doctrine of sin

Preaching

Scripture

Soteriology & Means of Grace

God saves; not perfection of church

Roman Catholics could be saved

Doctrinal deficiencies granted

Benefits can surmount ignorance

By the end, Travers seen as petty or inept



Articulating Anglicanism

Seeking a Positive Definition

Richard Hooker (1554-1600)

What's to be Done with Travers?

Returns to Temple; pink slipped

Hooker had asked for Travers to remain

Travers appeals; let me replace Hooker!

Travers will not give up his lodging

Travers will not worship anywhere else

Keeps returning to the Temple

Takes notes on Hooker's sermons

Complains

Asks Whitgift to act against Hooker

Appeals to Privy Council against Hooker

15 points against Hooker

Hooker patiently explains

Travers' misunderstands his positions



Articulating Anglicanism

Seeking a Positive Definition

Richard Hooker (1554-1600)

What's to be Done with Travers?

Travers loses support of other Puritans

Proposal to Parliament

Long shot

Replace BCP with T's liturgical texts

Flop

Remains at Temple to harass Hooker

Hooker to Whitgift: T's attacks helpful

Clarifies his own thought

Need: a carefully reasoned manual

Leads to Laws of Ecclesiastical Polity

Seeking a Positive Definition

Richard Hooker (1554-1600)

Laws of Ecclesiastical Polity

Concept: a book in defense of episcopacy

Becomes much more extensive work

Defense of the Church of England

esp. vs. Puritan critiques

Re: priesthood & liturgy

Books I-IV pub. 1593-1594

Book V pub. 1597

Books VI-VIII posthumous

Uses philosophy, law, history of theology

Addresses controversies at root

Books I-IV: groundwork

Book V: Defense of Settlement religion

Assortment of thinkers, writers, pastors

Not a movement

Diverse personalities

Shared convictions

Similar 'projects'

Common elements:

Cambridge: Scholarship & Devotion

Holy Scripture & Prayer Book:

Hallmarks of 'Settlement Anglicanism'

Heirs of Jewel and Hooker

Holy Scripture

Authoritative (and Uniquely So)

Inspired and Inspiring

Interpreted with aid of

tradition (especially patristic)

reason (deductive)

No 'regulative principle' approaches

Seeking a Positive Definition Caroline Divines

Prayer: Theological Language & Practice
Personal
Public

Worship: Theological Language & Practice Rather more ceremonial than Settlement Far more ceremonial than Puritans Not Puritan: aesthetics are appropriate Not 'Romish': an alternative aesthetic Politically Loyalist



Articulating Anglicanism

Seeking a Positive Definition Caroline Divines

Lancelot Andrewes (1555-1626)
Fellow of Pembroke College
Dean of Westminster
Bishop of Chichester, Ely, Winchester
Excelled as scholar, administrator, preacher
Exemplary pray-er; *Private Devotions*Reputed 5 hrs/day (private!)
Inclined to order & uniformity:
personal religion
public religion



Articulating Anglicanism

Seeking a Positive Definition Caroline Divines

John Donne (1573-1631)

Younger contemporary of L. Andrewes Raised Roman Catholic Studied law; bit of a rake Never intended to become priest or divine Ambitions fail; dabbles in theology Friends urged him to consider orders Feels unfit: past sins & present ambitions King James approves theological writings Ordained in 1615 Wife dies 1617; refocusing of vocation Intensified thought about death Chaplain to King James Prof of divinity at Cambridge Dean, St. Paul's, London Emotional, poetic, 'witty' preacher

Caroline Divines

Nicholas Ferrar (1592-1637)

Business man; Virginia Company Reintroduces religious life, based on family 1626: Little Gidding

Mother

Brother, sister-in-law, 3 children

Sister, brother-in-law, 16 children

Servants

Restored church

Instituted a pattern of prayers & devotion



Articulating Anglicanism

Seeking a Positive Definition Caroline Divines

George Herbert (1593-1633)

Remembered primarily for his poetry

Aristocratic family

Fellow of Trinity, Cambridge

Long journey to small country parish

(Bemerton, Wiltshire)

Died after 3 years as rector

The Temple: poems on the church

A Priest to the Temple: prose work on the

life of the country parson



Articulating Anglicanism

Seeking a Positive Definition Caroline Divines John Cosin (1594-1672)

Dean of Peterborough
Survived Civil War
Became Bishop of Durham
Helped to reestablish the church
Scholar, historian, liturgical expert
Assisted with 1662 Prayer Book



Articulating Anglicanism

Seeking a Positive Definition Caroline Divines

Herbert Thorndike (1598-1672)

Scholar & clergyman

Patristics, rabbinics, oriental lang.

Canon of Westminster

Wrote: early church order, liturgics

Epilogue: (in Latin)

Goods of the Protestant Reformation

Needs primitive discipline & teaching

Later recommended return to penance

After Restoration participated in

Savoy Conference

Prayer Book revision 1662

Influenced Tractarians

highly regarded by J.H. Newman

Library of Anglo-Catholic Theology

6 vols. (1844-56)

Scholar of Caius College
Fellow of All Souls, Oxford
Chaplain to Charles I (arrested 1645)
Chaplain to Lord Carberry (Wales)

Ductor Dubitantium: moral theology
Bishop:

Near end of interregnum Down and Connor, Ireland
